# "We've tried out car seats in store but doing it with a real baby is different"

When researching the baby kit, pushchoirs and car seats come out as top toys for the boys. Fathers-to-be love to compare braking systems, suspension and hondling os though babies and pushchoirs have more to do with Formula One than formula milk. And as for the car seat, making sure it doesn't clash with his treasured uphalstery can be the number-one selling point.

But for all the technical checking that goes into choosing these two most vital pieces of kit, do dods ever really check that they know how to use them? Or will they be struggling with the car seat in the hospital car park on the day they bring their new baby home?

To find out, we set two fathers-to-be their toughest challenge yet. First we borrowed baby Dexter (with mum on hand for cuddles), then asked the dads to toke him out of his pushchoir, strap him safely and securely into his car seat, fold the pushchair and put it in the boot. Simple. Or was it?

still fixed in it – with apprehension, like two
lions faced with an unknown predator.

Then, far several minutes, they try to remove the car seat. The handle is flipped to and fro, the apron clipped on and off, the pushchair turned this way and that... But still they are stumped. Until Tim spots a rather large red handle at the back of the car seat, with PULL HERE written across it in huge capital letters. "Ah!" they both say, somewhat sheepishly.







# TIM

With a sister 15 years younger, Tim spent his teenage years getting hands-on baby experience. But he still eyes baby Dexter nervously. 'It's a long time since my sister was little,' he says. 'And even though my wife Kotherine and I have tried car seats in store, daing it with a real baby is different.'

# BATTLE STATIONS

Alvin's frat itask is to get Dexter out of the pushchair and into the cor seot. And the groblems start almost immediately. As Alvin moves him towards the car seat, Dexter arches his back furiously. You can see him thinking, I om NOT going in this thing again!' So Alvin has to call on all his soothing skills, plus a Ittle tummy ticking, to get Dexter to bend graciously and submit to being strapped in. It's a head-to-head battle, and takes a long time, but at lost Alvin succeeds - then hos to pause for several maments to get his breath back,

into the car. Dexter eves Alvin worlly - he's not impressed. Struggling to get the belt: round the seat, Alvin contidhes it on all the edges and has to vankiitifiree. Luckily, just before Dexter lets out an enormous vell, he's clicked' in. And Alvin starts to breathe again. His relief, though, is short-lived. The seat belt is too loose, so Alvin has to spend even more time pulling it tight to make sure Dexter is safe. Heading off down the road like that could be dangerous.

# PUSHCHAIR PANACHE

Buttwith the car seat sorted, Alvin is in his element. Moybe his pushchair-buying research has poid off. With a twist and o flick, the pushchair is folded and securely closed, then slipped neatly into the boot. And he's not perturbed about the amount of room it takes up. 'Our Bugaboo's really neot,' he grins. 'I've tried it in our car and it leaves loads of room.' So he did da his homework after all.

# FIT TO TRAVEL

Finding the right car seat Isn't as never rest on the car seat frame, easy as you think, because not all seats fit all cars - and you don't want to discover you've bought the wrong one on the day your baby arrives.

Lots of people get it wrong -80% of seats are incompatible with the car or fitted incorrectly. So follow the car seat rules:

### RIPTING

E Car seats must conform to UN regulation ECE R44.03. Ensure your baby is in the weight range the seat is made for Buy the next size up as soon as his weight is over the limit. Mothercare stores have experts who can advise on the

right car seat for your car.

## USING

■ Follow the manufacturer's instructions when fitting the seat, and keep them handy. Practise, practise, practise - before your baby arrives. Ensure the seat belt is routed correctly round the seat.

Push your weight into fixed child seats as you tighten the seat belt to ensure there's na slack and the seat is secure. The seat-belt buckle should be straight when locked and

as it may snap open.

- > Your child seat should rest firmly on the main seat with little or no movement.
- Check you can't get more than two fingers between the harness straps and your child's chest; tight enough but comfy. The homess buckle should lie
- on baby's pelvis, not tummy. ■ Watch out for unsecured
- objects in an accident, a tissue box flying off the back shelf has the impact of a house brick.

### MAINTAINING

- E Regularly check fixed seats to ensure they haven't worked lose - pull on the harness to check.
- Replace seats or harnesses showing wear and tear, or in the event of a car accident.

# NEVER ...

- ...use a car seat on any seat fitted with a front air bag.
- a.modify a child seat, its fitting, the harness or buckle to make it fit your car.
- take your baby in a car without a car seat - even for short journeys or occasional lifts.
